NEONATAL POST-MORTEM EXAMINATION RECORD SHEET

This sheet can be used to summarize post-mortem findings. The form follows the steps in the *Neonatal Post-mortem Examination Checklist* and the *Neonatal Post-mortem Examination Guide**. Post-mortem findings should be included with your lambing/ewe records.

In most of the exam steps, you are asked to choose 'Yes' or 'No'. Some cases, however, may be more difficult than others to interpret. To reach the most likely conclusion about the cause of death it is important to look at the findings as a whole (i.e. do all of the findings support the same conclusion?). This exam looks for the most common causes of death. At times you may go through the steps and not find conclusive results. Consider contacting your veterinarian for more extensive testing or any time you are concerned about lamb deaths.
